

LCIF, Lions and Bridges

You may wonder what a picture of a collapsed railroad bridge has to do with Lions and with LCIF? It's easy. This nationally-televised picture of the collapsed railroad bridge in Sioux City shows the destructive force of the raging Big Sioux River during the floods in June. Further north along this railroad line are the hardest-hit communities of Akron and Hawarden in the western part of District 9NW. The damage is the worst ever.

In Akron, all the homes on the west side of the railroad embankment are red-tagged and pretty much destroyed. The people who lived there are now in campers, tents, living with friends or, if lucky, an apartment. Their belongings are mostly gone.

In Hawarden there were piles of debris and garbage

on every street corner. The Lions Paper Barn in Akron, used for recycling a total of nearly 1,000-tons of newsprint during the past 40 years, was completely destroyed and the contents a soggy mess. There were people who lost almost everything; some dazed and without hope, some looking for help, some hungry, needing everything. It left a situation for Lions to

mobilize resources and try to help. This is what LCIF is for!

Akron Lion Julie Ford contacted District Governor Mike Mulroney and a disaster grant application was sent to LCIF, which immediately approved \$10,000 in funds. Lion Julie and her friends in the Akron club have been busy ever since. The stories are heart-warming.

"The first person we helped was Sandy", Julie wrote. "She met me at our local grocery store. She wanted me to walk with her. She broke down and cried three times. She was so appreciative of what the Lions Club was doing. In the store she grabbed me and hugged me. It hit her hard. By her car, she asked for a hug while crying."

"Abby was the second person. She had an autistic 9th grader, an 11th grader and her aging mother living in her destroyed house. She walked so slowly throughout the store. At first they lived with friends but have now managed to find an apartment. She has no one to talk to. At the door she broke down and cried and hugged me.

Iowans at 22nd Annual Great Plains Lions Leadership Institute

The 22nd annual Great Plains Lions Leadership Institute (GPLLI) was held July 26-28 at Northwest Missouri State University in Maryville, Missouri. Twenty-nine students from five states, nine facilitators who are Faculty Development Institute graduates, and three staff members enjoyed a perfect weekend filled with fellowship and learning.

Iowa had 10 graduates, Kansas five, Missouri eight, Nebraska five, and Oklahoma two. Iowa students (see photo on Page 4) from District EC were Carmen and Mike Whitney; from District 9MC were Samantha Benda, Elisa Davenport, Stephen Hiracheta, Teresa Ingold, Elania Martinez, (four were from South Tama, the newest Lions club in Iowa); from District 9NC Mike Yore; from District 9NW Julie Ford; and from District 9SW Christopher Wilkins. Lisa Prochaska was a facilitator. Iowans serving as staff were Ardie and Ken Klemish as event coordinators. Gary Fry served as registrar.

Students attended nine classes, presented a three-minute speech on the final day, and participated in the traditional group skits. LCIF was our 2024 service project. Collectively, all the Lions at GPLLI and Midwest Faculty Development Institute donated \$8,139 to LCIF (part of that was a pledge).

Midwest Faculty Development Institute

A Midwest Faculty Development Institute was held simultaneously with GPLLI on the NWMSU campus in Maryville, Missouri. Twenty students attended. Iowa had three graduates – Paul Fugate and Carolyn Tonn from 9EC and Nancy Love from 9SE. Kansas had four graduates, Missouri three, Nebraska six, Oklahoma three, and Illinois had one. The two Lions Certified Instructors (LCIP) certified facilitators were Debbie Doty from Iowa and Jessica Troester from Missouri.

The coffee breaks, meals, and dorm rooms were shared by GPPLI and FDI students on the beautiful Maryville campus, which is home of the Missouri State Arboretum. For three days, we shared the lunch room with 300 high school soccer girls/

coaches in their uniforms...it was a busy place!

The goal of FDI attendees is to become FDI certified facilitators. All 20 attendees facilitated a 20-minute class on an assigned topic the last day of class. Their class was taped by a professional videographer and that tape submitted to LCI Leadership Division in Oak Brook, Illiniois to evaluate. Attendance at the institute does not automatically certify Lions as FDI facilitators. Rather, they are required to facilitate a class within six months and have that evaluated by an LCIP-certified instructor in their state or district. That evaluation is then submitted to the LCI Leadership Team. Upon a successful review, they receive "official" FDI certification with a pin and their name is added to the list of FDI-certified facilitators list in Oak Brook.

USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum

The 48th annual USA/Canada Forum will be held at the Kentucky International Convention Center in Louisville, Kentucky, Sept. 5-7. Two Iowans served on the Planning Committee: Ardie Klemish as Facilities Chair and Debbie Doty as Marketing Chair. As of Aug. 15, registration for the 2024 Forum was the highest since 2012 in Tampa, Florida.

The next three forums will be: Sept. 18-20, 2025 in Atlantic City, New Jersey; Sept. 3-5, 2026 in Memphis, Tennessee, where I'll serve as General Chair for the 50th anniversary celebration; and Sept. 16-18, 2027 in Huntsville, Alabama.

Iowa KidSight is proud to announce the posthumous awarding of the 2024 William E. Scott, M.D. Distinguished Legacy Award to Don and Joanne "Jo" Kothenbeutel of the Garner Lions Club. This prestigious award recognizes individuals who have demonstrated exceptional leadership, volunteerism, and dedication to the mission of Iowa KidSight, mirroring the passion and commitment of Dr. William E. Scott.

The William E. Scott, M.D. Distinguished Legacy Award was established to honor Dr. Scott's significant contributions to Iowa KidSight, including his leadership, financial support, and volunteer efforts. Dr. Scott is deeply committed to the early detection and treatment of vision problems in young children, a mission that Iowa KidSight continues to uphold through its free vision screenings for children from 6 months through kindergarten in all 99 counties of Iowa.

Don and Jo Kothenbeutel have left an indelible mark on the Iowa KidSight program through their unwavering service and dedication. As early pioneers, they trained as photographers in Iowa KidSight's inaugural year and conducted their first screening on Nov. 7, 2000, in Garner. Their commitment extended beyond screenings as they became Iowa KidSight trainers and district coordinators, significantly expanding the program's reach. Over the years, Don and Jo personally screened over 6,500 children, ensuring early detection and treatment of vision issues.

Their impact was not limited to their time and efforts. Don and Jo were also generous financial supporters of Iowa KidSight, and their estate planning ensures that their legacy of service and commitment will continue to benefit children across Iowa for years to come.

"The Ochoa twins were the third group of people we helped. They lived together in their house since their parents died some years ago. They lost everything. They are working at an Assisted Living Facility. When asked what they needed they were so dazed they did not know what to say. Finally we got them some pillows and some allergy medicine. They asked for a mattress; they are sleeping on the floor in an apartment.

"Another lady, a single mother with a 3-year-old autistic son, is now living in a small camper in the Hawarden City Park. We gave her a vacuum cleaner, some cleaning equipment and some books for her son. She wasn't expecting it and cried. It's been hard to listen to all these stories, I almost cried myself many times. Most of the affected

didn't have any flood insurance because they were not in a flood zone. Homeowners insurance doesn't cover flood related issues."

Julie and her Lions club friends, Gina West and Dee Watson, did a great job calling around to find and identify the people who really needed help. That is the best and most efficient use of our LCIF money to benefit those who really need it. Almost always they are the poorest in the community, living in the cheapest housing, working the most menial jobs, needing the most help. Thankfully, the communities of Akron and Hawarden also stepped up and provided much assistance.

There are too many stories to tell. It's been heartwarming to see the towns rally around the community. The people affected tear up when asked what the Lions Club can do for them. When they say thank you, we tell them "that's what we Lions do". God bless the people affected and the ones who stepped up to help.

The last train to cross over the collapsed bridge, only hours before it fell, is now standing marooned on a siding in Sioux City. It will be standing there for a long time with nowhere to go. Rebuilding the bridge is going to cost millions and we Lions cannot help with that. But we, and LCIF, can help build bridges for people in need!

Two New Ideas for Iowa

I wanted to give you the latest from the Council of Governors meeting held Aug. 10. The Council has given the go ahead to research and refine two new initiatives for the Lions of Iowa. First is a Capital Loan Program for small clubs who need money to start fundraising programs. Some popular fundraisers require some expenditure of money to get started that new and small clubs may not have. Interest from funds of the sale of the Lions office in Ames is generating around \$25,000 per year and that money could be used for interest free loans to MD9 Lions clubs for various needs.

The second idea concerns the Alert program. It is proposed that two trailers could be outfitted with supplies most needed by victims of natural disasters. One trailer would service the eastern side of the state and the other would service the western side. It looks like the homes for the trailers could be at Camp Courageous in the east and Fort Dodge in the west. LCIF might help with the purchase of the trailers, but would not help with restocking after a disaster.

Be sure to put Nov. 1-3, 2024 on your calendar. We used to have a Mid-Winter Leadership Conference and the drives to Des Moines could be treacherous in January weather. 

Lions Come Together to Aid Flooded Town, Hoping to Charter New Club from Service

On the weekend of June 23, the City of Spencer in northwest Iowa was hit with devastating floods. Forty percent of the homes in the town of 11,000 were damaged or destroyed. The clean-up and efforts to rebuild started immediately and will continue for months into the future.

Spencer does not have a Lions club, so Past District Governor Roger Curtis approached the district about providing assistance. District Governor Mike Mulroney and the district cabinet decided the best way to help was to provide a free lunch to the clean-up workers and flooding victims. A plan was set into motion. On July 24, Lions from the following clubs descended on the Spencer Walmart parking lot and began to set up a serving line: Badger, Everly, Fort Dodge Noon, Manson, and Peterson.

Three grills were soon up and running, with Lions preparing chicken breasts, brisket, brats, hot dogs, and hamburgers. The menu included cookies, chips, fresh fruit slices and veggies, bottled water, or a choice of pop. Several of those served shared their stories of destroyed basements and flooded homes. Many expressed appreciations for this act of support and kindness.

District Global Service Chair PDG Cliff Weldon offered his thanks and expressed his appreciation to the Lions of the district, who worked the service event. Financial help also came from District 9MC, the Wall Lake Lions Club and 9NW District Care Fund for the donations that paid for the meals. A total of \$4,000 was collected for this project, and 22 Lions provided 189 hours of service to purchase, cook, and serve meals to 407 hungry and grateful people!

Sensing that there was a need for a Lions club in Spencer, PDG Jim Gill asked attendees if they were interested in learning more about forming a new club. He garnered almost 20 names and phone numbers. Either the Everly Lions or the Peterson Lions will work with the district governor and his cabinet to provide support for this effort.
