

Don't Get Locked Out of Your Lions Facebook Page Account

Lions clubs are finding their club's Facebook pages being suspended or removed by Meta, the parent company of Facebook, at an alarming rate. So much so that the Global Lions Forum page has had quite a bit of discussion on it.

Sharon Eberhardt, one of the Global Lions Forum moderators, suggests that if your club's page uses the Lion logo (past or present) as its profile photo (like shown at right), you should probably consider changing it immediately. "The logo as a profile photo seems to be the common denominator in suspensions we have been hearing about recently," Eberhardt said. "So while we know we have permission to use the logo (from Lions International), Meta's definition of impersonation, a Community Standard, doesn't seem to allow that for our clubs."

The Great Plains Lions Leadership Institute Facebook page was recently "locked out" for 10 years because Meta assumed GPLLI was "impersonating" another business (in this case, Lions International). Moderators, including your editor, ignored warnings received in Messenger, assuming they were simply phishing scams. Moderators are still trying to get the page unlocked, but until Meta does unlock it, the group cannot post any new updates.

It is because of the issue with the GPLLI Facebook page that the cover and profile pictures for

the Iowa Lions Facebook page were changed so it is no longer using the Lions logo in either graphic.

What alternatives are there? "Plenty." said Eberhardt. "There is a Lions graphics group that might help, but you could also use AI to generate an avatar for your club and highlight something your club is known for (think Lion recycling, Lion running a marathon, Lion flipping pancakes)."

The current graphics used on the Iowa Lions page were created using the AI app in Canva. Canva has a free side to it, but any organization that is actually a 501(c)(3) can apply for a free Canva Pro account, which opens up even more marketing tools.

I would add that districts should consider doing the same with their Facebook and Instagram pages, as well. Meta owns both Facebook and Instagram.

"Now is the time to brand your club!" suggested Eberhardt.

Let's do the same for the remainder of our 2025 district conventions AND our MD9 State Convention June 6-8, 2025, where International 2nd Vice President Mark Lyon will be our guest at the Des Moines Airport Holiday Inn...in the center of the state, easily accessible by interstate for every Iowa Lion! It's been a long time since MD9 had a sitting international executive officer guest!

News from the 2024 Fall International Board of Directors Meeting

The Oct. 13-16, 2024 meeting agenda was full: PID Tony Benbow from Australia received the unanimous endorsement from executive officers and all LCI board members for 3rd Vice President to be elected in Orlando, Florida in 2025.

Brief details of the meeting:

District/Club Administration: five club officer e-books are being consolidated into ONE and will launch April 2025. Membership & service e-books are being discontinued. District governors MUST report their district convention date in the Lion Portal in order to receive the club delegate report for voting. Redistricting fees will probably increase in the future. Leadership: Lions Certified Instructor Program for USA/Canada is Feb. 28-Mar. 3 in Toronto, Ontario. Twenty students were selected from 69 applicants. Congrats to PDG Lisa Prochaska from Clear Lake for being selected as a student! PID Ardie was asked to be one of the two instructors for the class but had to decline because of USA/Canada Forum duties.

2024-25 1VDG/DGE Training: Phase 1 of online classes were assigned on Sept. 13, 2024 and Phase 2 assigned Nov. 8. Phase 3 launches in April 2025. Mandatory in-person training will be Feb. 11-13, 2025 in St. Charles, Illinois, with 685 district governor elects registered to attend. The final day of 1VDG/DGE training is in Orlando in July. The 2024-25 2nd vice district governor virtual training seminar was completed Dec. 5,

2024 with 35 classrooms, each completing six sessions. There were 657 2VDGs registered and they have their participant manuals and pre-assignments to be completed by June 30. The RLLI (GPLLI) curriculum will be revised for 2025-26 year.

Marketing: The new global advertising campaign will include "You Belong" and "Find Yours" and roll out in 2025, along with a branded recruitment kit to showcase Mission 1.5.

2025 International Convention: Moved from Mexico City to Orlando Florida, July 13-17 in the Orange County Convention Center. Headquarters hotel is the Disney Swan Resort. DGEs will all be in the Rosen Shingle Creek Hotel. Officer delegations will be in Rosen Centre and Hyatt Regency Hotels. Early bird registration of \$190 ends March 1. Regular registration is \$265, March 2 thru July 10. Attendees (except DGEs) will select the hotel of their choice when they register.

Membership: Twenty Mission 1.5 summits have been completed globally for DGs and Global Membership Team and Global Extension Team coordinators. GAT Area Leaders are now required to be at least a PDG.

Service: As of Nov. 30, 2024, 49% of clubs globally have reported service with humanitarian, hunger, and environment being the top three causes reported.

IT: The LCIF donation processing delay has been reduced and should be back to the standard processing of 2-3 weeks by early 2025.

Legal: This committee oversees elections at international convention. There are currently 17 officially-endorsed candidates from the U.S. to fill only SIX director positions open for election in Orlando. At least 11 candidates will be asked to "step back".

LCIF: As of Dec. 12, 2024, 644 grants totaling \$18.9 million have been awarded this 2024-25 year. Only 3.3% of individual Lion members have supported LCIF this year. Iowa has received several grants for tornado victims this year. Major catastrophe grants have been awarded in the USA for hurricanes, Japan for flooding, and India for landslides and cyclones. We thank our corporate strategic partners for major donations this year: Johnson & Johnson, Norisys Technologies, Walt Disney Co./ESPN, Lavelle Fund for the Blind, and Cowen Foundation (just to name a few). They help LCIF make a HUGE impact on the lives of thousands of people in need around the world EVERY DAY!

Our 2024-25 LCIF Chairman Immediate Past International President Dr. Patti Hill has challenged every Lion leader to make a personal \$50 donation to LCIF this year..less than \$1 per week! Remember, **every penny** you give to LCIF **goes to help someone in need**. Not one cent is used for administrative costs.




Happy New Year, Lions!

A History of Type 1 Diabetes

As early as 3000 BC, there are descriptions of an unusual disease involving frequent urination. As time passed, physicians compiled a list of symptoms, conjectured the cause, developed methods of diagnosis and hunted for an effective treatment for this malady. Various researchers began to suspect that there may be two forms of the disease called Diabetes Mellitus.

By the time of the U.S. Civil War, it was an accepted fact that there were two forms, one which appeared in infants to adolescents, called juvenile diabetes, and one that developed in adults, often as they aged, called adult onset diabetes.

Sir Harold Percival Himsworth published research in 1936 that established there were indeed two types of diabetes mellitus: Type 1– an auto-immune disease that causes the body to lose the ability to produce insulin and Type 2 – a disease that occurs when the body's cells become resistant to insulin and the pancreas can't produce enough insulin to compensate.

When you eat food, your digestive system breaks down some of the food you ate into glucose (sugar), which is your body's main source of energy. The glucose enters your blood stream which signals your pancreas to release insulin. The insulin helps the glucose in your blood enter your muscle, fat and liver cells so they can use it for energy or store it for later use.

When all the glucose has entered your cells and the level of glucose in your bloodstream decreases, your body signals your pancreas to stop producing insulin. If you do not have enough insulin, too much glucose builds up in your blood, causing hyperglycemia (high blood sugar) and your body can't use the food you ate for energy. Left untreated, this can lead to serious health problems or even death.

Today, we describe Type 1 diabetes as an autoimmune disease that occurs when the body's immune system destroys the pancreas's insulin-producing Beta cells. This results in high blood glucose (sugar) levels which causes blood vessels to constrict raising the blood pressure (hypertension) damaging the capillaries (small blood vessels) and starving tissue of the needed blood.

There are two variants of Type 1: one with

antibodies, which means the blood contains one or more of the four pancreatic islet antibodies that are markers of Beta cell autoimmunity; and the second without antibodies, which means no detectible antibodies have developed. Type 1 without antibodies comprises 15% of Type 1 patients.

There are 1.24 million people in the U.S. with Type 1 diabetes today and the number is expected to reach 5 million by 2050. About 7% of people with diabetes have Type 1.

Type 1 diabetes can appear at any age and the damage to the insulin-producing Beta cells can take months to develop, or even years. In children, there are two noticeable periods that it frequently is initially observed. The first is between 4 and 7 years of age and the second is between 10 and 14. It can appear any time in adults, and is called Latent Autoimmune Diabetes in Adults (LADA). This is sometimes known as Type 1.5.

Type 1 is the most common chronic (long term or for life) disease to affect children in the U.S.

Symptoms of Type 1 Diabetes include:

- Increased thirst
- Feeling very hungry
- Frequent urination
- Bed wetting in children who never wet the bed
- Unexplained weight loss
- Mood changes
- Feeling tired and weak
- Blurry vision
- Dry or itchy skin
- Sores that heal slowly
- Tingling or loss of feeling in the feet
- Yeast infection in women

Factors that can increase your risk for Type 1:

Genetic: The risk of developing Type 1 with no family history is .4% If your biological mother has Type 1, your risk is 1% to 4% and 3% to 8% if your father has it. If both parents have Type 1, then your risk is as high as 30%.

Gender: No gender difference in risk.

Geography: The percentage of people in the local

Club Officer Elections: A Gentle Reminder

How many of you use the Who's Who, A Roster of Lion Leaders? Have you ever been frustrated by an email that is not up-to-date or phone number that has the numbers inverted? This is your BIG chance to assist your state secretary in putting together an edition of the Who's Who that will be accurate and up-to-date. And, by the way, the sooner you get your information into the Portal, the happier I will be!

April is the time when you should be conducting the election of club officers for the next Lions year so that the results will be reported on the Lion Portal NO LATER than May 15. Please pay attention to this deadline, as it will facilitate the compilation of the 2025-2026 Who's Who by the state office.

Lions Clubs International Standard Club Constitution & By-Laws states that club officer elections should be held in April and that club secretaries are to report the results of the election within 15 days.

Officers should be recorded under the tab "Next Lions Year" even if they are repeating officers. This will give them access to the Portal on July 1.

population who have Type 1 increases as you move away from the equator.

The exact cause of Type 1, what triggers the immune system, which fights bacteria and viruses, to attack the Beta cells is unknown. Researchers are investigating genetics, exposure to viruses or bacteria, and environmental factors as possible causes. There is no known way to prevent Type 1 diabetes.

If left untreated, Type 1 Diabetes can, over time, affect some major systems in the body and these complications can lead to disabilities and even threaten one's life. Some complications of Type 1 include:

Cardiovascular system: coronary artery disease with chest pain (angina), narrowing of the arteries (atherosclerosis), high blood pressure (hypertension), heart attack and stroke.

Ophthalmological: Diabetes is the leading cause of blindness. Diabetes can damage the capillaries in the retina (part of the eye that senses light) (diabetic retinopathy) It can also increase the risk of cataracts, glaucoma, sensitivity to light and night vision.

Neurological: Lack of circulation from capillaries that feed the nerves causes nerve damage (neuropathy) tingling, numbness, burning or pain, especially in the legs. This usually begins at the tips of the toes or fingers and works its way up the limb. Eventually,

there may be a loss of feeling in the limb. Nerve damage and the poor circulation in the feet may cause a cut or bruise to become infected and go unnoticed. If the wound develops gangrene, the toe, foot or leg may be amputated. Damage to the nerves of the digestive system may cause nausea, vomiting, diarrhea or constipation.

Nephrology: Diabetes is the most frequent cause of kidney damage (nephropathy). The kidneys are composed of millions of tiny capillaries that aid in the removal of waste from the blood. When the system is damaged, the damage cannot be reversed. This may lead to kidney failure or end-stage kidney disease which can only be treated with dialysis or a kidney transplant.

Dermatological and oral: Diabetes may leave your skin and mouth more prone to bacterial and fungal infections. Gum disease and dry mouth are more likely.

Reproductive: Gestational diabetes and pregnancy complications: High blood glucose can be dangerous for the mother and child and increases the risk of miscarriage, stillbirth and birth defects. For the mother diabetes increases the risk of ketoacidosis, retinopathy, hypertension, and preeclampsia. For men, erectile dysfunction may be an issue.

The U.S. Space Force began Aug. 29, 2019. "Always Above" representing the protection of U.S. satellites and international space.

project on social media.



The Lions Clubs of Iowa presents three major awards each year during the international banquet at the Iowa Lions State Convention. Iowa Lions come for an evening formal banquet to hear the keynote address from the international guest, to experience fellowship, and to honor fellow Lions who've completed exemplary work at the club, district, multiple district, international, and COMMUNITY levels.

Now is the time to submit those applications for the Ralph A. Whitten Service Award, the G.E. "Bud" Klise Leadership Award, and the Spark Plug Award for an emerging Lion leader. Nomination forms for all three awards are available on the Lowa Lions website forms page. All applications must by typed. Be sure to include ALL the service and leadership qualifications for your nominee, not just in Lions but in life, for ALL they do for your community. Please include supporting details on each application. All applications must be postmarked by Feb. 28 – no exceptions. Applications are judged by the MD9 past international directors and the council chair. Finalists for each award are notified by mail and invited to attend the banquet at the state convention.

Ralph A. Whitten Service Award

The Lions of Iowa Council of Governors created the Ralph A. Whitten Service Award in 1994-95. It is presented in honor of the memory of PID Ralph Whitten from Urbandale. PID Ralph served as an International Director 1961-1963 and was instrumental in Iowa Lions until his death in 1998. PID Ralph was extremely service oriented, so this award was established to honor other Lions for their **exemplary service** at the club, district, and/or multiple district level.

The first award was made in 1995 with an annual award made every year since. The Whitten Service Award is only at the state level. District service

awards may NOT use Whitten in their title.

G.E. "Bud" Klise Leadership Award

The Lions of Iowa Council of Governors established the Klise Leadership Award in 1989 upon the suggestion of PID Norm Dean. The award is to honor the memory of PID G.E. "Bud" Klise from Stockport. PID Bud served as an International Director 1980-82. He exemplified leadership in every aspect of life: Lionism at all levels, as well as in his community. He and his wife, Marilyn, were beloved by everyone who met them. His life was cut short by a fatal traffic accident shortly after he announced that he was a candidate for Lions Clubs International vice president.

The Klise Leadership Award is only at the state level. Districts may NOT use Klise in their titles. **Spark Plug Award**

Send Spark Plug nominations to PID Ardie Klemish, PO Box 175, Anita, Iowa 50020

After approval by the Lions of Iowa Council of Governors in 2014, PID Dave Stoufer established the Spark Plug Award. A spark plug starts an engine and keeps it in motion. The Spark Plug Award honors Lions who give that same spark to a Lions' project at any level: club, district, or multiple district. Its purpose is to **recognize and encourage emerging Lion leaders** for their energy, creativity, and inspiration to others. There is no length of membership requirement. There are no requirements to hold any particular office. This award is to simply to recognize and honor our emerging leaders, not current or past leaders.

Any club or individual Lion may submit nominations-it's not just for the district governor to submit nominations. The Spark Plug award is only at the state level. Districts may NOT use "Spark Plug" in their award titles.

How Your Lions Club Can Join Adopt-A-Highway

The Adopt-A-Highway Program in Iowa has over 1,200 groups contributing to keep 27% of Iowa highways clean. You can find the available state highways to adopt on the <u>Adopt-A-Highway page</u> of the Iowa Department of Transportation website.

The Adopt-A-Highway program requires two pickups per year. I schedule a Sunday afternoon in April, June, and September for clean-up. I figured by scheduling three, I had a rain-date. The April clean-up is the heaviest, because the trash is easily seen with the shorter grass.

At the county level, county highways can also be adopted. Contact the County Highway Department. In some counties, the Board of Supervisors needs to approve the application. Follow through to make sure the sponsor sign is posted and to get bags and vests.

The "Pick Up Iowa" program, through the

organization Keep Iowa Beautiful, is helping local groups to clean up our towns and highways. I did this "Pick-Up" program in 2021 for the Adopt-A-Highway stretch with Western Dubuque Lions Club. I received grabbers, two sizes of trash bags, and a 5-gallon Lowes bucket free the first year. The "Pick Up" dates for the application are between April 15-July 31. Apply by April 30 on the Pick-Up Iowa page of the Keep Iowa Beautiful website. With Pick-Up Iowa in 2022, 3,500 volunteers donated over 6,555 hours to local pick-up events with an estimated 2,100 bags of trash collected.

For any cleanup, the most important part is to bring water for volunteers and meet afterwards at an ice cream shop to "Trash Talk." The Adopt-A-Highway clean-up is a great activity to involve students over 14 years old (or with parental supervision if under 14).
